Red Cross Assesses Radiation Effects in Belorussia

[Text] Gomel January 17 TASS—By TASS correspondent Lidiya Peresypkina:

People should be evacuated from areas in Belorussia with high radiation contamination resulting from the Chernobyl accident. This was established by a group of experts of the International League of Red Cross Socieites which visited Belorussia.

Experts surveyed the ecological and social situation in districts affected by the Chernobyl accident. Head of the group, Albrecht Kellerer, director of the Institute of Medical Radiology, FRG, believes the expedition has served its purpose.

For a few days, foreign specialists in medical radiology, social psychology and immunology met with officials and residents of the Mogilev and Gomel regions, and went to cities and villages to establish the nature and scale of required assistance.

"We got convinced that the situation is very serious," Kellerer told TASS. "There are areas where contamination rate is so high that they are unsuitable for human habitation. At the same time there are regions where people throughout their lifetime will not receive a radiation dose surpassing 35 Rem," he said.

"But even in those areas people are subjected to negative psychological effects, such as anxiety and nervousness. This interferes with a normal mode of life. For instance, parents do not allow children to play outdoors for long. The traditional diet has been changed. This largely results from the lack of information," Kellerer noted.

He said his colleagues and himself are of the opinion that local hospitals should have psychiatrists on their staff and that psychological assistance can be of much importance.

Kellerer said that the International League of Red Cross Societies will do everything possible to help the Belorussian people to eliminate the consequences of the accident.

Contaminated Ukrainian Villages Evacuated

[Text] The government of Ukraine passed a resolution on the additional evacuation of the residents of population centers located in the zone of increased contamination by radioactive fallout after the accident at the Chernobyl AES. Fourteen villages in Kiev and Zhitomir oblasts and the rayon centers of Narodichi and Polesskoye and the urban-type settlement of Vilcha are among the areas to be evacuated. Altogether this includes 3,370 families, or over 5,500 people. New living quarters in multi-story buldings and individual homes, as well as the necessary social and cultural buildings will be built for them. Over

175 million rubles have been earmarked for this purpose. The construction is intended to take two years to complete.

Ukrainian Committee Sends Support to Armenians

Confrontation on nationality differences can be avoided by changing the federation itself.

The republican club of USSR people's deputies adopted a resolution to this effect at its session. Serhiy Sobutskyy reports.

[Sobutskyy] The document stresses that the great-power policy of Stalin and his clique to create a unitary pseudosocialist centrist empire has ended in a fiasco. One of the fundamental goals of restructuring should be the creation of a genuine voluntary union of sovereign states and peoples after their self-determination—a new Union of Soviet Republics. The document notes that only political methods and means which are based on the inviolable rights of the peoples of the USSR can ensure the creation of such a united state. The USSR should be based on the complete legalization of a nation's right to self-determination in freely chosen forms of sovereignty.

The resolution urges inclusion on the agenda of the 3d session of the USSR Supreme Soviet a question on the principles of restructuring the union and on working out a new declaration on a new union treaty.
