

I. PERSONAL INVENTORY

Respondent does not wish to give his name, requests that a code name be used. He is 25 years old, male, divorced, of Roman Catholic religion, was born in Budapest, spent most of his life there. Just before the outbreak of the revolution he was living in Budapest; Pozsonye Road, unwilling to give the number. He was abroad in Poland in 1950 for a 2-week vacation, never performed military service. He has a civil engineering diploma, was working since 1950, his last place of employment being a state drafting bureau. He was a child in 1945 and before the war.

His parents are not living. They died during the war -- persecuted as Jews. He has one brother 30 years old, now residing in Budapest. No children.

He left Budapest November 24, arrived in U.S. December 16. He has only been in Camp Kilmer and New York City. His immediate plans are to obtain a living.

He has been interviewed since leaving Hungary by the Austrian police in Vienna, by the U.S. Consulate in Vienna, and by the immigration authorities in Camp Kilmer. These were routine questionings.

He speaks, besides Hungarian, English, though not perfectly, and some German.
