12. Occupation: At 20, respondent entered the Hungarian Foreign Service. On November 9, 1944, respondent left Hungarian Foreign Service. He re-entered on February 19, 1945, on the occasion of the liberation of Hungary. At that time, he organized the Foreign Ministry at Bilda. Again left Foreign Service on January 27, 1948. From that time until he left Hungary, he worked as a private interpreter and translator specializing in translation of engineering and technical material.

19. Immediate Plans: In the immediate future, he plans to function as an observer to the UN on behalf of groups still in Hungary. He has also planned several lecture tours in Europe and South America.
20. Interviewed by other Western agencies: He has already testified before various governmental agencies. He has testified to the UN General Assembly Committee on Hungary. He has testified in front of Congress, to several State Department agencies, to the USIA, and he has had a seven hour interview with a US Congressman. He has also testified in front of a joint session of the Congressional Foreign Affairs Committees.
21. Foreign languages: He has varying degrees of fluency in the following languages: Hungarian, English, German, French, Chinese, Arabic, Dutch, Italian, Spanish, Norwegian, Swedish, and Danish.
